Professor Brien Nolan



Prof Nolan is course chair of the MSc in Astrophysics and Relativity, a one-year programme which offers students the opportunity to study these topics at an advanced level while also developing skills in areas such as data analytics and computational science.

"I'm a mathematical physicist, so my research is about trying to answer questions about the fundamental nature of our physical universe using mathematical tools. My main research interests are in General Relativity, Einstein's geometric theory of the gravitational field. I'm interested in questions about spacetime singularities - regions in the deep interior of black holes, or at the Big Bang marking the beginning of our physical universe. I'm also interested in questions about how light and other types of waves are disrupted by strong gravitational fields - for example, in the vicinity of a black hole.

I was always interested in science and physics, and I really enjoyed maths, particularly the problemsolving aspect of the discipline. What appeals to me most strongly about mathematical physics is that it combines the two: fundamental questions about physics give rise to fascinating mathematical problems. I'm in the lucky position to spend a big part of my working life trying to solve these kinds of problems, discussing them with colleagues, and teaching students how to tackle such problems themselves.

A key feature of the MSc in Astrophysics and Relativity is that it allows students to develop their knowledge of these areas to the stage where they will be able to embark on their own research as a PhD student, while at the same time equipping them with transferable skills in data analysis, machine learning and computational science - areas that are highly valued by a wide range of employers." 8

Tom Burke is a documentary filmmaker and Chair of the new Masters in Documentary Practice at the School of Communications. His film credits include 'Sold: The Eircom Shares Saga', which was watched on RTÉ by over half a million viewers.

"I am interested in how documentary films are made in every sense - the cameras, the sound, the editing, the complex relationships between directors and their subjects. My most recent research is on the latter point where I interviewed fourteen leading Irish documentarians on the ethical dimensions of their work. The resulting film offers a unique insight into how filmmakers view the role of consent in the process of filmmaking and what the limits of this consent might be. People are interesting, they cannot help it. Their faces, their voices, their backgrounds, motivations, body language, self-awareness.

Though it may sound trite, documentary film at its very best can be more revealing of personhood than other art forms. A great film, or even a very good one, is able to not just tell us things but to make us feel things about what we have been told. As a form of storytelling, it is endlessly complex and intriguing.

The MA in Documentary Practice aims to produce a cohort of filmmakers who are technically self-sufficient, narratively skilled and emotionally aware of the demands of the work. We aim to produce useful people, reflective people and skilled people - ideally all in the one person."

Aisling Murray Fleming is Chair of the MSc and Postgraduate Diploma in Guidance Counselling programmes in the School of Human Development.

"I am interested in all aspects of career development, from examining whether it's beneficial to ask primary school children "what do you want to be when you grow up" to exploring re-careering or career changes in later life.

I am passionate about hearing people's stories, and guidance is deeply rooted in those narratives. Our profession goes beyond supporting individuals through life's key transitions - it's about empowering them with the skills, mindset, and knowledge to realise their full potential."

The MSc and Grad Dip Guidance programmes offer initial education and training in the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for practice in the interrelated areas of personal, education and career guidance counselling. A key element of the programme is the strong emphasis on reflective practice and personal growth facilitated by personal counselling, placement practice experience and professional supervision to support and enable personal and professional development.

Working in Ireland as an International Student

Ireland's Employer Ecosystem

Ireland is the European base for over 1,000 leading multinational companies in sectors such as IT, pharmaceuticals, and finance. Major companies like Google, IBM, Meta, Pfizer, Oracle, and Deloitte have all chosen Ireland as their hub, creating a demand for a skilled and educated workforce to support their success.

Working in Ireland while studying

Students attending a full-time course who have an Irish Residence Permit card are entitled to take up casual/part-time employment while studying in Ireland provided that their course of study is included on the government's list of visa-eligible courses, known as the ILEP.

This will entitle you to undertake part-time work for up to 20 hours per week during term time, and up to 40 hours full-time work per week during two standardised periods of 15th December to 15th January and between the 1st of June and the 30th of September. These dates are subject to change and are fixed for all non-EU students, regardless of the actual college teaching calendar for their course. In order to work in Ireland you will need to get a Personal Public Service Number (PPS Number), but you need to have evidence of a job offer to secure one. The first step is to find work, and then apply for a PPS Number. You can find out more from Citizens' Information: citizensinformation.ie

Working in Ireland after you graduate

After successfully completing your studies you can take advantage of a visa stay-back option to remain and work in Ireland.

International students who complete an undergraduate degree at DCU can apply for the Third Level Graduate Programme (Stamp 1G). Stamp 1G allows you to work in Ireland for 12 months from the date of issue of final results.

International students who complete a Master's Degree, a Post-Graduate Diploma or a PhD can obtain Stamp 1G to remain in Ireland for up to 24 months after they graduate. Full details can be found at irishimmigration.ie

DCU Merit Scholarship

DCU offers partial merit-based scholarships to some non-EU students. You are automatically considered for a scholarship when you apply as a non-EU student to DCU. We'll let you know if you have qualified for a scholarship when we contact you to advise if your application to study at DCU has been successful.

Humanities and Social Sciences Bursary

This merit-based bursary is available for high-achieving non-EU applicants who have received an offer to study on a postgraduate programme in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. Successful recipients will receive a €2,000 fee reduction on the full-time 2025-2026 non-EU tuition fees for their postgraduate programme. All non-EU applications to a postgraduate programme in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences are automatically considered for this bursary. Only successful recipients of the bursary will be notified via email.

Faculty of Engineering and Computing International Scholarship

This scholarship is available for non-EU applicants who have received an offer to study on eligible postgraduate programmes in the Faculty of Engineering and Computing. Successful recipients will receive a €5,900 fee reduction on the full-time 2025–2026 non-EU Tuition fee.

Eligible programmes for 2025-26 are:

- MEng Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering
- MSc in Computing
- MSc Electronic and Computer Engineering
- MSc Electronic and Computer Technology

All non-EU applications to a postgraduate programme in the Faculty of Engineering and Computing are automatically considered for this bursary. Successful recipients of the bursary will be notified via email.

Business School International Scholarship

This scholarship is available for non-EU applicants who have received an offer to study on eligible postgraduate programmes in DCU Business School. Successful recipients will receive a €900-€1,400 fee reduction on the full-time 2025–2026 non-EU Tuition fee.

Health and Fitness

You want to be part of a university that encourages physical wellbeing and a healthy lifestyle. We want you to have the opportunity to enjoy all the benefits of exercise, fitness, dance and sport while you study with us.

DCU Sports Complex, located on the DCU Glasnevin Campus, is a stateof-the-art facility, incorporating health, wellness and sports to meet all your exercise and leisure needs. Membership is available to DCU students on an academic or yearly rate with membership including access to the gym, pool, spa facilities, fitness centre and group fitness classes.

DCU Sports Arena, also located on the DCU Glasnevin Campus, hosts sports such as basketball, badminton and volleyball, and can facilitate other activities. It also has a climbing wall, two squash courts, a racquetball/ handball court and several studios. DCU has multiple sports grounds, a high-performance centre and a soccer centre.

The DCU St Patrick's Campus has several sports facilities including a fitness studio, two sports halls, a GAA pitch and a soccer pitch.

Accommodation

On our Glasnevin Campus, our College Park apartments have a dedicated postgraduate block, which is available on a 9-month basis, from September to May. These apartments contain 5 double en suite bedrooms with both wifi and fixed-line internet access.

Our Postgraduate Apartments on the Glasnevin Campus offer highquality accommodation for over 100 postgraduate students in the heart of the research community. Rental accommodation at the Centre is in 37 secure, comfortable apartments with en suite bedrooms. The accommodation is let on a 50-week basis only. The majority of rooms are let as single bedrooms, however, a limited number of double rooms are also available.

On the All Hallows Campus, we have a limited number of rooms available for 9-month occupancy. There are sixty-three bedrooms available in Purcell House to students at all levels of study. Accommodation is in single or double bedrooms (single occupancy only) with either en suite or shared bathroom facilities. Each bedroom has a study area and wifi access. There is a large communal kitchen and shared lounge areas.

For 2025/2026, O'Donnell House in All Hallows is also available to book. The rooms are single occupancy bedrooms with shared kitchen and bathroom facilities. 45 units are available for 50-week occupancy. All Hallows is a five-minute walk from our St Patrick's Campus in Drumcondra and within easy reach of the DCU Glasnevin on public transport.

Please note that all students including postgraduates will be charged a €50.00 fee for 2024/2025 applications to DCU Rooms.

Entry Requirements

In general, the entry requirement for all taught postgraduate programmes is a primary degree of at least Second Class Honours standard from a recognised university or degree-awarding body. In some cases, approved equivalent qualification from a recognised professional body will suffice. As part of the selection process, an interview may be required.

In some cases, candidates not possessing the above entry qualification may be admitted provided that they can demonstrate exceptional aptitude or ability and/or substantial relevant work experience in a field related to the programme.

In line with DCU's Recognition of Prior Learning Policy, candidates who do not have the appropriate level of academic attainment for direct entry may apply for access via the Recognition of Prior Learning process (RPL). Prior learning may be formal accredited learning or experiential/uncertified learning which includes the knowledge, skills and personal qualities acquired through life, work experience and study which are not formally attested. Detailed entry requirements and specific guidance and information relating to academic and other requirements associated with the programme are available in each of the programme descriptors on our website. English Language Requirements

Applicants whose first language is not English must provide evidence of equivalent competence in the English Language in a recognised English language test. The minimum standard in the English language varies by faculty, details can be found at: dcu.ie/registry/englishlanguage-requirements-nonnative-speakers-english-registry

Your English language certificate must be awarded within two years of the start date of your DCU programme. In exceptional circumstances, results in examinations other than those published may be accepted as proof of competence in the English language. This may include non-native speakers of English who have completed their education through the medium of English in a country where English is the official language. Please include the details of any English language examinations and proof of successful completion when applying to DCU.



How to Apply

Postgraduate Taught Programmes

Candidates seeking admission to all full-time and part-time postgraduate taught programmes must apply online through DCU's Student Application Portal which can be accessed here: dcuie2. elluciancrmrecruit.com/Apply/ Account/Login

Applicants can apply for up to three taught programmes or one research programme when making an application to DCU.

Programmes should be selected in order of preference. The cost of applying is €50 and is a nonrefundable fee payable to DCU.

You must upload documentation relevant to your application through your account, such as certified transcripts for every year of study including the overall grade awarded, passport, and, if applicable, the English Language requirement. Other additional documentation may be requested during the application stage and must be provided prior to DCU's assessment.

On receipt of the application fee, your application will be available to view on the system. Applicants are notified by email. It is, therefore, imperative that applicants have a secure email account and review it regularly for updates, as no other means of communication between DCU and prospective applicants will be used. If you are successful and receive an offer, you will be required to make a €500 deposit via the student applicant portal in order to accept your place.

Closing Dates for Applications

EU and non-EU applications to full-time and part-time postgraduate taught programmes should note that each programme has an initial closing date indicating when applications should be submitted. Applications may be reviewed by DCU Admissions before or after the closing date.

Please note that all postgraduate programmes offered through DCU have entry requirements. In addition to qualifications, some programmes require extra information and applicants are asked to familiarise themselves with their programme(s) of choice before making an application. 
